Biographie André

André Doumbè est né le 24 Septembre 1949 en banlieue d'Ébolowa, une ville du sud du Cameroun. André était marié à Rose Makolle Sengue, qu'il a épousée en décembre 2013. Lui survivent sa mère, son épouse, un fils, deux filles, deux frères et deux sœurs, ainsi que de nombreux parents au Cameroun, en Europe et au Canada.

André a fait une bonne partie de ses études au Cameroun. Au milieu des années 70, il est recruté par la compagnie aérienne Cameroon Airlines où il devient responsable à la direction en charge de la comptabilité. Très vite remarqué par ses supérieurs pour son sens de l'organisation et son leadership, il est envoyé au Ghana comme représentant de la compagnie aérienne dans ce pays. À 29 ans (1978), il devient malgré lui la plus haute autorité camerounaise au Ghana. Sans allégeance politique, André Doumbè côtoie beaucoup de gens parmi lesquels les opposants au régime de Yaoundé. Ce qui lui vaut des menaces des services secrets camerounais. En mai 78, aidé par un ami pasteur canadien, il fuit le Ghana pour atterrir à Vancouver. Commence alors une période de petits boulots, d'anxiété et de d'incertitude qui va durer deux ans et demi avant l'obtention de son statut d'immigrant. C'est la période au cours de laquelle André prend conscience de la précarité et de la vulnérabilité de l'immigrant. Deux faits qui vont marquer son engament communautaire.

Au début des années 80, André aménage à Montréal. Il travaille pour la compagnie Mother Tuckers qui, en 1986, l'envoie à Winnipeg comme gérant des achats. Il rencontre Emmanuelle Abelé en 1989; puis ils se marient en 1996. Leur fille Eyala-Dipita vient au monde en 1998. À partir des années 2000, André commence à travailler pour divers départements du gouvernement fédéral : Revenu Canada, le Bureau de la Traduction et enfin, Agriculture Canada qu'il intègre en 2006 comme Agent d'information sur les marchés. Poste qu'il occupera jusqu'à sa mort le 12 septembre 2017.

Parallèlement à sa carrière professionnelle, André a été un entrepreneur communautaire prolifique. African Communities of Manitoba Inc (Acomi), Sous le Baobab, African Center, Afro-fonds, African Investment Club, Youth Investment Club, Folklorama, le Conseil de l'immigration du Manitoba, la Commission des droits de la personne du Manitoba, Centraide de Winnipeg, Cancer Care, la Coalition des parents francophones du Manitoba, etc. sont quelques-unes des organisations qu'André a marqué de son empreinte.

Leader incontesté, André Doumbè savait transmettre à ceux et celles qui étaient proches de lui sa passion et son engagement pour l'autre. Son leitmotiv était «on avance!» et sa devise, «une action vaut mieux que mille mots». André savait tirer le meilleur de ceux et celles qui l'entouraient.

Africain d'origine, André incarnait à merveille le Baobab, ce grand arbre tutélaire qui fournit à tout le monde, quelle que soit sa provenance, son ombre (le réconfort), ses fruits (de l'aide), ses feuilles pour manger et se soigner, et son ombrage pour la convivialité.

Aujourd'hui un Baobab est tombé mais il n'est pas mort. Il nous laisse un patrimoine immense : des œuvres qui ne demandent qu'à être préservées, dans des actions qui nous inspireront sans cesse. «si le grain ne meurt, il ne saurait germer» (Jean, 12 :24). André s'en va pour que germent de nouvelles graines de Baobab... pour le bien de l'humanité!

André Biography

André was born on September 24th, 1949 in Ebolowa, a Southern Cameroonian city. André was married to Rose Makolle Sengue, whom he married in December 2013. He is survived by his mother, wife, two brothers, two sisters, a son, two daughters and many extended family relatives in Cameroon, Europe and Canada.

Andre's education mainly took place in Cameroon. In the mid 70's, he started working for Cameroon Airlines in the Accounting Department, and thanks to his remarkable sense of organization and leadership, was soon posted to Accra, Ghana. In 1978, at 29, he became the highest ranking Cameroonian representative of the airline in Ghana. While in Accra, he mingled with a lot of people, including opponents of the Cameroonian regime. He received threats from the Cameroonian Secret Services. In May '78, with the help of a Canadian pastor in Ghana, he fled to Canada, arriving in Vancouver. For the next two years, he lived by doing small jobs while waiting for his immigrant status with anxiety and uncertainty. That period of his life determined who he will become in his community work for the rest of his life as he experienced vulnerability and precariousness.

In 1980, André moved to Montreal where he started working for Mother Tucker's and the company sent him to Winnipeg in 1986 as a Purchasing Manager. He met Emmanuelle Abelé in 1989 and they get married in 1996. Their daughter Eyala-Dipita was born in 1998. From 2000 on, André worked for several federal departments, Revenue Canada, the Translation Bureau and Agriculture and Agrifood Canada in 2006. He was still working there when he passed away on Sept. 12, 2017.

Beside his work life, André was a very active community entrepreneur. He was involved with several organizations including being the President of the African Communities of Manitoba Inc. (Acomi), founding member of Sous le Baobab, Afro-Fonds, the African Center, the African Investment Club, the Youth Investment Club, Folklorama, le Manitoba Immigration Council, the Manitoba Human Rights Commission, United Way Winnipeg, Cancer Care and la Coalition des parents francophones du Manitoba among others.

A great leader, André knew how to communicate his passion to others and never ceased to work for and with the community. His moto was "Let's move forward" and "Action is louder than words". André knew how to get the best out of the people he was working with. A life well lived, a man well loved!

As an African, André was the incarnation of the famous baobab tree: a huge tree that provides shade (comfort and conviviality), fruits (help), and its leaves to eat and heal those that need them, no matter where they came from.

Today, a bigger than life baobab fell but he is still with us, providing a heritage to preserve and actions that are inspiring to all of us: " ...unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds". John 12:24.

André had to leave us to be able to produce many seeds, for the good of Humanity!




